

The Little Plant

Contexts

Mother Nature has many wonderful things. The trees, plants, birds and animals around us make our world more beautiful. They are so different from one another in shape, size and colour.

Have you observed how plants grow? Do you wonder where they come from? The poem 'The Little Plant' will help us understand the natural world a little better.

Paraphrase

The poem tells the story of a small seed. A tiny plant lies fast asleep inside a seed. One by one, the sunshine and the raindrops try to wake the little plant up. Slowly, the plant wakes up and grows out of the seed. It is very happy to see the beautiful world around it.

Perspectives

- ▶ The small plant is woken up by the soft sunlight and bright raindrops.
 - How do you wake up every morning?
 - What are some of the things you do before going to school in the morning?
- ▶ The little plant sees the wonderful world around it and is very happy.
 - What are the things that you see early in the morning? Also, think about the sounds you hear.
- Find out how a seed grows into a plant.

Higher Order Thinking Skills

- 1. The little plant lay asleep in the 'heart of a seed'. What do you think the heart of the seed means?
- 2. The poet says the little plant arose and saw how wonderful the world might be. What are the things the little plant must have seen?

B. Hats Off to the Antonyms






A–Z with Common Nouns

B. Catch the Silent 'E'


Listen carefully as the teacher calls out some words. In the grid below find and colour the box for each word with a silent 'e' that she says. Use a pink colour pencil.
